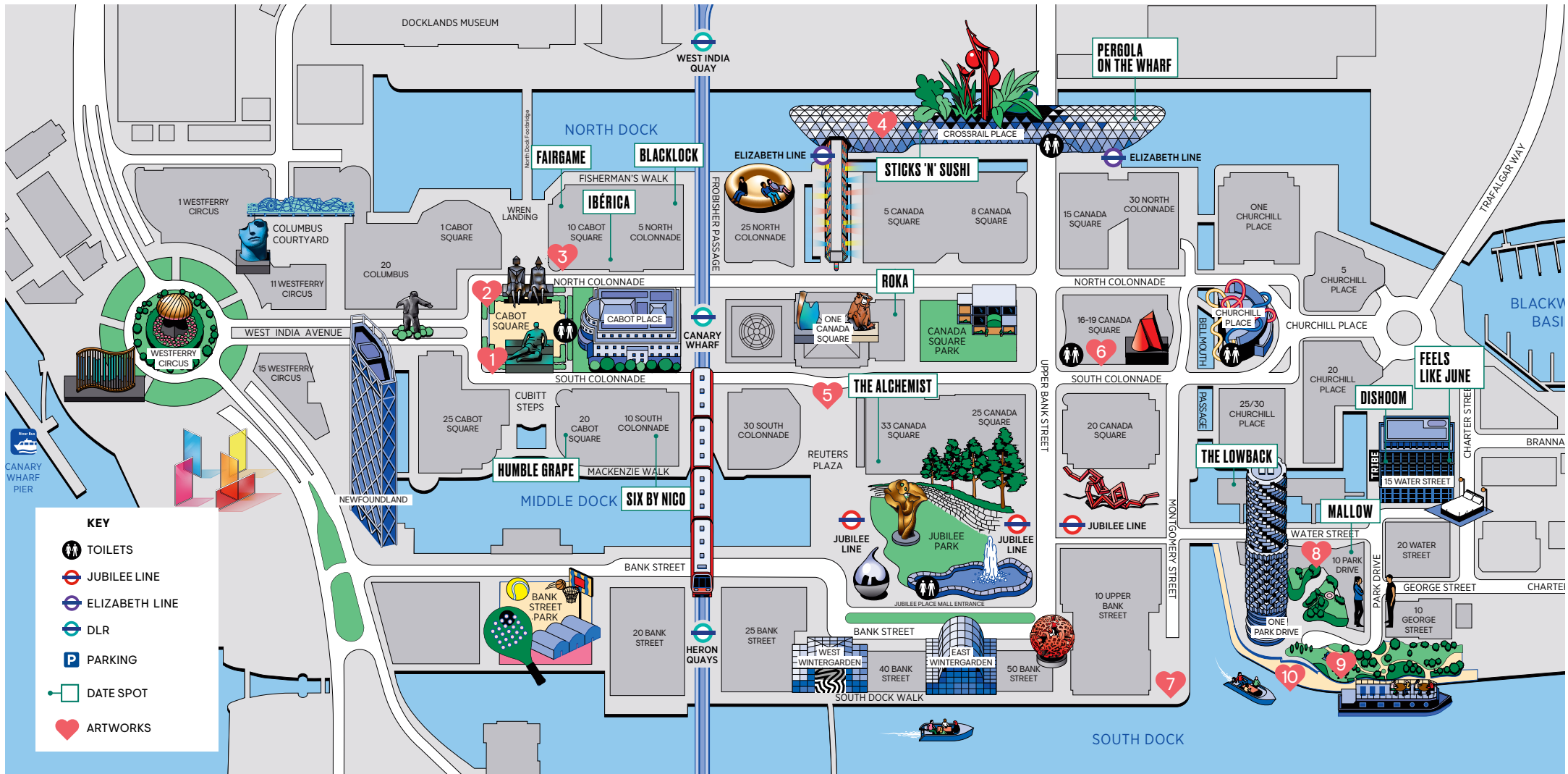

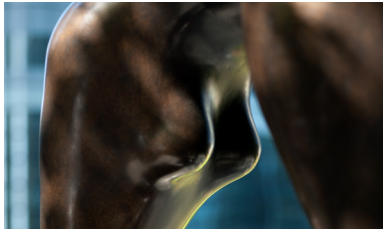

It Takes Two by Bob Allen
Cabot Square

Abstracted human figures stretch up, simultaneously pulling away, whilst also being completely structurally reliant on one another. Allen lends this seemingly ephemeral, and intimate, gesture permanence by casting it in bronze.

Couple on Seat by Lynn Chadwick
Cabot Square

Represented by geometric heads juxtaposed by the softer folds of clothing that drape over the bench, this couple suggests a sense of relaxed intimacy, as if they have been in each other's company for a long time.

Returning to Embrace by Jon Buck
10 North Colonnade

Jon Buck's sculpture appears to show a couple locked together, gazing into each other's eyes. Closer examination reveals a strange fusion of forms, their bodies so far intertwined as to have become a single organism.

Electro-Rainbow by Lothar Götz
Crossrail Place (Level -1)

Celebrating queer love and identity, this installation takes inspiration from the Progress Pride Rainbow Flag. Lothar also sees the work akin to the floor of a disco or cub, echoing the importance of club culture in LGBTQ+ communities.

Tandem Lovers by Gillie and Marc
South Colonnade

On a bicycle made for two, Rabbitwoman and Dogman travel the world together sharing their love.

Kiss by Nigel Hall
South Colonnade

Represented by two geometric shapes, *Kiss* shows two entities naturally balancing each other out and yet a slight gap remains between them creating a simmering tension.

Together, Basking on the South Quay by Lydia Hamblet
Montgomery Street

Bring a loved one and bask together in the glow of this vibrant 15-meter mural. Overlooking the South Quay, Hamblet's work is concerned with creating shared encounters within the public realm.

The Knot by Richard Hudson
Water Street

A shiny, curved surface folds itself into a complex knot. This seductive, mirrored surface creates the perfect opportunity for a selfie with your loved one.

Minotaur and Hare on Bench by Sophie Ryder
Harbour Quay Gardens

This sculpture displays a minotaur and hare in a quiet embrace enjoying the view across the water. Here, Ryder treads the line between mythical and human love.

Spirit of Place by Simone Brewster
Harbour Quay Gardens

These 5 columns are an ode to the cork oak trees at Herdade de Rio Frio. With its warm tones and evocation of a forest, *Spirit of Place*, located in the picturesque Harbour Quay Gardens, is perfect for nature lovers to meander through.
